2. The Clubs auditors to confirm the result of the resolution to adopt the proposed new Club Rules with effect from the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting to be held in March 2021

The Chairman declared the new rules would come into effect from March 2021 and thanked all those in favour for their support.

3. Any Other Business

Only those items of "any other business" forwarded to the Chief Executive, in writing before Friday 30th October will be discussed on the night at the SGM.

The Chairman notified the meeting of one item from Mark Beecroft-Stretton who asked

"What does the roadmap, key milestones and decision points look like to get the club to ECB gold standard and what are the estimated costs to achieve this?"

The Chairman responded as follows.

"Many thanks for your question Mark which is particularly pertinent given the current difficult financial position.

To be absolutely frank whilst the Supervisory Board has looked at the gold standard requirements our focus at this stage has been on achieving the silver standard. To this end I shall be writing to all members before the end of this month with details of our proposed transition arrangements and the roadmap to silver standard. This includes establishing an Interim Nominations Committee who will manage the election process for the five elected members, determine the initial terms of election and also propose and manage the appointment process for the three appointed Supervisory Board roles.

The costs to date are no more than the time of Supervisory Board members for which I am very grateful, and the Executive. The former is of course free and the latter is an opportunity cost rather than a real cost.

There will however be a real cost to the Club before March next year as we will have to appoint a part-time board secretary.

Once the new Supervisory Board has been established the roadmap to achieving gold standard will not be particularly costly but more investment in time and introducing new, good modern governance practices this will include:

- Establishing a formal Nominations Committee with appropriate terms of reference
- Establishing a new Supervisory Board subgroup and committees and reporting mechanisms
- Establishing Supervisory Board subgroup and committee protocols and modus operandi
- Introducing annual board appraisals
- Writing an annual compliance statement
- Implementing a four-year external independent governance review

We do not see any of this incurring cost in excess of £10,000 per annum which of course will be far less than the cost implications of not complying with the ECB's governance framework and therefore a potential reduction in ECB core funding.

Hopefully Mark that answers your question so far as I can at this stage, if not please do not hesitate to get in touch with me directly."

Mark was present on the meeting and acknowledged the answer given to him.

The Special General Meeting was formally closed at 7.54pm and was followed by a Q&A with Club President John Wright.

Chairman

Welcome to the 2020 Annual Report.

“Unexpected, unprecedented, unwelcome.”

The year 2020 will live long in our memories. To say that it was challenging and difficult is a gross understatement. The global pandemic that reached our shores just before the cricket season was due to start has affected all our lives and many of our Members and supporters have suffered hardship and lost loved ones. Our thoughts and prayers are with them all.

If I could sum up 2020, I would say that what happened was unexpected, unprecedented and unwelcome. However, despite the adversity I am pleased to record and acknowledge in this report, the magnificent response to the crisis by everyone at Derbyshire County Cricket Club both on and off the field of play. Our Club has continued to play an important part in the lives of our Members, supporters and the wider Derbyshire community.

I am sure that many Members will be surprised to see that the Annual Accounts show a relatively comfortable position in comparison with previous years. A close examination however reveals that we lost over £1.8 million in revenue as a result of the pandemic which closed the ground to spectators and for events for most of the year. However, we were able to mitigate this lost income in a number of ways.

First, the ECB maintained its distributions to all First-Class Counties in full and added further payments to support us. Second, we as a Club took full advantage of the Government's schemes such as furlough and deferrals to save money and conserve cash. Third, we deferred the contracts of our two overseas players with their agreement, and fourth we restructured our off-field team which unfortunately resulted in job losses and redundancies. We also imposed a freeze on discretionary spending and closely examined non-discretionary expenditure.

On top of this nearly two-thirds of our Members donated their subscriptions to the Club and almost another one in five deferred their Membership until 2021. Once more I must sincerely thank everyone for their generosity and commitment to the Club. Finally, we were able to offer our ground to the ECB who created a bio-secure venue for training camps used by the Pakistan, West Indian and Australian men's touring teams and for the England and West Indian women's teams training and international matches. This earned us much needed revenue, but it meant that our players had to train at Repton and play the whole season away from home. That they agreed to do so without hesitation

speaks highly of their contribution and commitment to the Club.

It is important to pay tribute to the ECB at this point. Not only did they manage to secure the game's broadcasting fees by staging the full programme of international matches albeit behind closed doors, but they distributed additional payments to all the Counties, and were supportive, communicative, helpful and responsive throughout, even though they were implementing significant cost cutting measures within their own organisation. Their team who stationed themselves at the Incora County Ground for three months while it was a bio-secure bubble epitomised the ECB's response and approach – they were, like our own team quite magnificent.

So, whilst the 2020 profit exceeded the budget, we will need this cushion to see us through 2021 when we cannot expect an additional distribution from the ECB, the furlough scheme is less generous and unlikely to be maintained, sponsorship will be difficult to attract and we are unlikely to be allowed to have a full conference and events programme or welcome as many supporters as we would like. We have also decided to commit to overseas players this year to strengthen our squad. It will not be an easy year but it is manageable and we remain committed to being sustainable and debt-free by 2024, except for the long-term mortgage on the Gateway building.



In the delayed 2020 cricket season a five game Bob Willis Trophy replaced the County Championship. We finished a very creditable second to Yorkshire in our regional group with the fifth best points tally of all 18 Counties. It was an encouraging outcome and all-round team effort particularly as every game was played away. Unfortunately, we were unable to carry this form into the only white ball competition when we failed to recover from a weather disrupted poor start to the T20 Blast. Nevertheless, across the season there were a number of memorable performances particularly from our younger players, to offer us encouragement for the coming season when we will also have overseas players once again.

We received considerable praise from the men's and women's international teams that used the Incoira County Ground during the summer and from the highest levels at the ECB. It was a tireless effort by the whole off-field team and the extra touches such as the mini-golf course, the international cuisine, surprise birthday cakes and more were thoroughly appreciated. I cannot speak too highly of the job done by all the events team, ground staff and the operations team who worked long hours and made sure that we enhanced our reputation as efficient, friendly and accommodating hosts.

Many Members have joined our online forums which we started in April and have now become a monthly event. We regularly get over a hundred attendees and as a means of communicating with members and keeping you updated, they are irreplaceable. Members have made it very clear on social media channels and in emails that they welcome this innovation. The Board recognises these events as a positive benefit arising from the pandemic and there is every likelihood that they will continue after we return to the new normal and certainly as long as members want them.

The global pandemic has not slowed our progress towards a more modern governance structure that fully complies with the ECB's requirements. An overwhelming majority of Members voted to adopt new Club Rules which will increase the size of the Board from six to ten and introduce both executive and appointed non-executive Directors. There is still much work to do before the February 2022 deadline and your constructive support in helping us introduce the changes seamlessly without fuss is much appreciated.

Nor has it halted our ambitious plans to redevelop the Incoira County Ground and improve our facilities. Ian McFarlane has led this work and his report gives further details.

In closing I should like to express my thanks and appreciation to Ryan Duckett and his small team that have worked tirelessly throughout the pandemic in very difficult circumstances to keep the Club going. Life has not been easy either for our players, coaches and support staff who had to train and play away from the Incoira County Ground and who now have to train in small, socially distanced groups in winter with doors and windows open to ensure proper ventilation. Well done to you all.

I am also indebted once again to my colleagues on the Board who give so much time, effort and wise counsel to the Club. I am delighted that they have all offered themselves to the Members for re-election so that we can continue our progress both on and off the field and to make a real contribution to the game of cricket in England.

Lets hope that the sun shines this summer and that we will all be able to watch and enjoy some exciting cricket together at the Incoira County Ground.

It is my pleasure to present this year's annual accounts with a commendable positive result. This has been achieved in an incredibly difficult year where the Club has had to deal with Covid impact and not being able to welcome members and supporters into the Incora County Ground. On the back of a positive financial result in the previous year 2019, we wanted to make sure we do not compromise the financial stability of the club despite this unprecedented experience and impact of the pandemic.

The Executives of the club and the Board worked very hard on this and delivering a surplus and positive cash flow in the year clearly demonstrates the effectiveness of the steps we have taken so far in our journey to turn our financial state of the club to a robust position. Further it is important to note that we have received a clean audit report with no material items of deficiency reported by our external auditors, Smith Cooper, in their management letter.

In 2019 we presented a surplus from operations before taxation of £400k and in 2020 we deliver a profit before taxation of £668k, after tax we deliver a surplus of £530k. We originally budgeted for a surplus before taxation of £548k.

Looking into more detail, we had budgeted for £5,591k revenue in 2020, Covid had a severe impact and we lost £1,816k of revenue we had budgeted to receive. This meant we had to take immediate action to protect the Club's Finances and cash position. As you will know we gave Members the choice of how we dealt with their membership fees for 2020, we are extremely grateful to those members who helped us out by deferring or donating their membership if they were able to. We utilised the Government's Coronavirus Job Retention scheme by placing most of our staff, including players, on furlough leave at certain times of the year to maximise the benefit which delivered £466k of income.

Further we took the opportunity to generate £1,176k of revenue by hosting of Pakistan and Australia mens sides and the England and West Indies Women behind the closed doors on behalf of ECB. This revenue had cost associated to it but we were able to deliver a significant profit from this arrangement and at the same time gained lot of respect from ECB for the way we organised that at short notice to support them. After all that we were still short of the revenue compared to our budget and that was mitigated by having a tight control of our expenditure and costs.

We made savings of variable costs by not delivering matchdays, conferences and events in addition to saving c£200k of cost from the Cricket Budget by deferring the contracts of the overseas players.

As you will see in the Accounts, due to all these efforts and also accelerated release of some funds by ECB, we were actually able to exceed budget and ensure the Club has a positive cash balance of £1,241k. This will provide a strong foundation to help the Club deal with future uncertainty as we enter 2021 and beyond.

In 2020 we were also able to improve the balance sheet position, after paying the contractual instalment of £300k of a loan to Derby City Council in the year, the balance left is reduced to £1,227k. The board is considering the possibility of making an additional payment against the loan in early 2021 to reduce the outstanding balance even further.

The cash flow forecast looks healthy over the next 12 months but we have a lot of uncertainty and the 2021 budget has more risk due to possible after effects of Covid. We expect this cash balance will enable us to manage through fluctuations in revenues and costs during the year without having to borrow and for the year we have set a healthy but challenging budget.

We are very keen to deliver our ambition of becoming debt free club by the end of 2024 apart from our long-term mortgage we have on the Gateway Building (Indoor School). This of course depends on the economic circumstances post Covid and the target is to work hard and explore all possible sources to generate extra revenue as much as possible to support this. Further we want to keep to our promise of maintaining investment in our playing squad and also to invest in improving the facilities and infrastructure of the Club for the benefit of our members and supporters over the next few years.

Our over-riding focus remains to manage the club's finances in a responsible manner to enable long term sustainability and robust financial state.

GROUND DEVELOPMENT

I must begin this year's report by commending the work of the Operations and Events Team throughout the 2020 season. In exceptionally difficult circumstances and at very short notice the Team organised training camps for the Pakistan, Australia and West Indies Women touring parties as well as an England vs West Indies T20 series.

All of this was undertaken in a Covid safe environment and the thanks and praise we have received from all the touring parties and the ECB is a credit to those involved.

Without doubt as a consequence of this work the profile and standing of DCCC has risen within the game and in the eyes of the ECB, a magnificent effort!

What a difference a year makes, 12 months ago following a good 2019 financial performance and on the back of proposed maintenance and ground development grants from the ECB we were preparing master plans for a series of development initiatives. The Covid pandemic put all of these plans on hold.

The ECB has understandably put ground development grants on hold until there is greater clarity on future revenue streams however to their credit, they intend to continue with the proposed £300k per year maintenance grant over a 5-year period.

Given the uncertain outlook, as a Board we have decided in the short term to take a similar cautious position by minimising capital and operational expenditure from our own funds, however we do intend to utilise the full ECB maintenance grant each year.

Our first priority is the installation of a new scoreboard with replay and cinema capabilities, tenders have been received and orders will be placed imminently with a scheduled installation late summer.

The next priority is a new toilet block which is proposed for early 2022.

Our plans for replacement floodlights and a new events facility are now on hold until the longer-term financial situation is clearer.

To all Members thank you for your patience and understanding in difficult times, keep well, stay safe and I look forward to catching up with as many of you as possible for an enjoyable 2021 season.

All of us that donated or deferred memberships have also played their part and the effects of that will not only be seen in 2020 but throughout 2021 so a thank you to all of you that were able to give that support.

It has been particularly frustrating that 2020 happened during the clubs 150th Anniversary year. As many of you know we had a good number of events that would have celebrated this with our planning centred around involving members in all of these. Our intentions are to pick these up where possible in 2021 and more information will follow in due course when we know how the lifting of restrictions will allow us to confirm these events.

Finally, as I always say, please feel free to catch-up with me at any time during the season. I am always happy to listen and discuss any Member's priorities but more importantly let us hope we can finally get back to watching some cricket together down at the ground.

Thankfully, due to the support we have had from our Members and key stakeholders, as well as the proactive decisions we have made as a Board, we are in a stronger position than we may well have been.

For obvious reasons much of my work as the Club's Legal Services Director is confidential however, I have liaised throughout the year with the executive management team to offer support and guidance where possible, during what has been an unbelievably challenging year for everyone connected with the Club.

The Supervisory Board continues to be committed to ensuring we have the highest standards of corporate governance. In line with our County Partnership Agreement we have done a huge amount of essential work over the last twelve months to ensure that we are on track to be compliant with the ECB's Governance Framework by 31 January. The first necessary step was to make some amendments to our Supervisory Board structure and the Club Rules. I would like to thank all Members who contributed during our consultation process and for the unanimous support for our proposals, which will come into effect from 31 March 2021.

The Governance Group will continue to meet on a monthly basis to ensure that we introduce the new Governance 'Good Practice' needed. These are in line with the new structure, thereby ensuring that we meet the minimum standards, which will underpin our core ECB funding.

I was delighted that the Club was able to play a key role in delivering the ECB's Men's and Women's international programme with the Incorea County Ground becoming a Bio-secure bubble for much of last summer. This was crucial to safeguarding revenue streams to support all aspects of the game in this country.

I was also delighted to see Derbyshire's very own Sarah Glenn leading the way with some outstanding performances for England in their series against the West Indies. Hopefully Sarah's performances will inspire more women and girls across the county to play cricket in school or at their local community club.

A huge thank you to all of our Members for their support over the last year - it is much appreciated and I look forward to joining you back at the Incorea County Ground this summer.

Independent Auditor's Report

Independent Auditors' Report to the Members of Derbyshire County Cricket Club Limited

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Derbyshire County Cricket Club Limited (the 'Club') for the year ended 31 December 2020 which comprise the Revenue Account, the Balance Sheet and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.
